

Suffering and Anxiety

"I have told you these things, so that in me you may have peace. In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world." John 16:33

As a church family we know that recently in the world and even amongst the congregations there has been much pain and suffering and loss. Especially in the last few years. I also sense that anxiety is

also on the increase. There are so many things that can cause this rise of anxiety: the cost of living, the cost of heating, illness and death, the unknown future?

When one part of the body suffers, we all suffer. In times like these big questions

can come up and they are difficult to answer. Communication of feelings and thoughts is vital for our mental health. So let me say here 'Don't bottle things up'. Find a friend to talk things over with, if you would like a chat with me, just make that known.

God never promised us an easy life here on earth, but when hard times happen it can knock our faith. There is a teaching in the Bible that tells us that some of Jesus disciples left him. Things became too hard for them! It is in these hard times that God wants us to draw near to Him, so He can give comfort and reassure us that He still loves us. Even if that doesn't make the problem go away!

God is always on His throne; He sees over everything. I don't think that He causes everything to happen. When I fell off my bike and hurt my ribs, I don't think God stuck an invisible stick into my spokes! I believe accidents happen. I may have a follow up question of "why didn't you catch me?". So, whatever you're going through right now, talk to God about it.

He is open to hearing your questions and He is also open to hearing the anger you may be feeling about your situation. God knows and understands emotions, so talk to Him. One of the verses that shows Jesus's emotion was at the death of Lazarus. Jesus meets Lazarus's sisters, and in the Bible it simply says 'Jesus wept'... He cried and shared his tears with the sisters who had lost their brother. He was overcome by emotions.

One strange thing about that shedding of tears is the fact that he then goes on to bring Lazarus back to life? So why was Jesus crying when he knew that was about to happen? He could have said "don't cry, it is going to be alright". He didn't do that, he just wept with them...

SAVING IN 2023

NEW VOTING RULES—VOTER ID

You may have seen advertisements where it mentions that photo ID is now required to be presented when you go to vote. Examples of photo ID are passports, driving licences (not the paper kind) and bus passes.

If you have not got any of these the Elections Bill makes provision for an "Electoral Identity Document" to be provided free of charge, to ensure that all electors have access to an accepted form of identification – this will be a free Voter Card, issued by local authorities online, by post or in person. Details of how to get one will be included on the Voter Card that is already issued to everyone eligible to vote.


FROM THE EDITOR

To start, we went to both schools for their nativities. Sheila and Joanne went to Jesmond Gardens to watch the Reception class. It was a proper Nativity with the story of Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem, and all the children dressed up, complete with donkeys. The children sang some lovely songs. Afterwards, they joined the parents and staff along with children to draw and colour some nativity pictures. To finish, there was coffee and biscuits.

I went to watch the "Inn-inspectors" performed by Year 3 at Throston School. Again, this was the Nativity story, but with a bit of a twist—the Inn-inspectors. And again, all the children took part and the singing was wonderful.

The second week saw both schools in Church. First, we had Year 4 from Throston. The theme was 'How does the church use light at Christmas?'. We used Advent to introduce the Advent Wreath, which would have been new to most children. We talked about the meaning of Advent and showed candles, cards, boxes and even a bar of chocolate as ways they might celebrate Advent. We then went into the Parish Centre to create a wreath on a plate. After refreshments the children sang a couple of their nativity carols to thank our juice makers, Margaret Drady and Margaret Inman.



Jesmond Gardens Reception class asked if they would come and sing some carols in church for us—how could we refuse! They were absolutely marvellous; 30 four year olds singing was magical. While they were in ch urch, they had a quick look around. Most of these children had never been in a church before but went away with smiles on their faces and looking forward to coming back at the end of January.

Last but not least was the Christmas Eve Nativity in Church. It was nice to have a good sized audience with some families from pre Covid.

In a Small Corner of Provence

Now it is winter. The days are short and the nights long. Down to the village shop to get the bread is in the dark. The hot days of summer are a distant memory. Everyone with thick coats and scarves, rubbing their hands and chatting in the warmth of the village shop. The smell of bread coming from the bakery. A place to meet friends,



to talk about the weather and discuss the hunting season.

November is the season of rain, heavy rain, which all vineyard owners need for the water table to rise. This is vital for the vines to survive the summer heats. It is rain on the plain, but all around (as low as 400m) there is new snow on the distant peaks. Provence is known for its blue skies and sunshine for 300 days of the year. In winter the frosts and sunshine make the vineyards sparkle. Some vines and trees still have their golden autumn colours.

In December the Christmas decorations in the village start to appear. The Christmas tree goes up and everyone helps to decorate it. Villagers go out into the countryside to collect ivy, holly and conifer branches, not only to decorate their houses, but to decorate the streets. Everywhere the 'Marche de Noel' takes place—lots of gifts and festive food for sale. In Provence most places have a Nativity on display, but they are unique. They are full of small painted clay figures of people of the village, called 'Santons', representing every occupation and activity. In some villages, people dress up in old costumes and join the service at midnight on Christmas Eve.

Into the New Year it is time to get back to work in the vineyards. Now 1,000s of vines over 100s of acres are pruned by hand. The cold Mistral blowing down from the Alps makes it cold work, but essential. It must all be done before spring arrives in March when the days become warmer and the vine buds open soon to flower. The season of the vine growing starts again.
